
# Team Effort




## C DOC A valance dresses up the windows and frames the views. Complementing the large farmhouse sink, a small round sink for prepping vegetables takes up minimal space in the island.

#### On Second Thought

Although the island serves as a beautiful focal point, the homeowner wishes it had been made a bit smaller. It is certainly a work of art, but from a practical standpoint, there are certain things that don't work. It's hard to open the refrigerator when people are sitting on the stools, and it's too big to reach all the way across when cleaning it.



The design team for this waterfront home consisted of architect John Lederer, a partner in Lederer and Wright of Bay Head, New Jersey, interior designer Suzette Donleavy, of Well-Designed Interiors in Shrewsbury. and kitchen designer Edith Leonardis with technician Wesley Jewel, of Leonardis Kitchens in Morristown. "They all worked beautifully together," say the wife. How did these experts join forces? "All the meetings were team efforts," says Leonardis. "That's why the

project was so successful."

The homeowners wanted a certain ambiance throughout the house—an English classic style. So, it was important that all the spaces relate to one another. White oak floors run from the living areas into the breakfast room and the kitchen. Colors are subtle throughout, and the fabrics and furnishings all have a rich look.


For the kitchen, the team selected cabinetry with a timeless elegance. "The style of the door-an inset-and the furniturequality details were very important," says interior designer Donleavy. But it's the color of the cabinets a soothing buttery vellow that the homeowner really loves. Also, the hearth above the range was carefully designed to be a focal point in the room. Custommade, it certainly makes a statement, but does so in a subtle way, complementing the surrounding cabinetry without overshadowing it.

Other well-planned details, like the glass doors and display niches, were a collaboration between Donleavy, Leonardis, and the homeowner to create a gracious and timeless appeal.

At the center of the kitchen is the room's showstopper—an oversized island topped with a counter of Autumn Wheat granite (take note of the extrathick edge!). The island is perfect for breakfasts on the go and acts as a buffet when the homeowners entertain.

According to Leonardis, such informal entertaining is becoming ever more popular these days, and rather than using the formal dining room table, she says, "people are using their islands as service areas." The island's crowning glory? A small sink fit neatly into the corner that can be filled with ice for chilling bottles of wine during parties. The rest of the time, the sink provides an alternative spot for rinsing vegetables. And because the sink is in

the corner of the island, plenty of counter space remains for preparing and serving meals.

Naturally, the appliances are topof-the-line. A built-in refrigerator, two wall ovens, and a six-burner cooktop all combine good looks with high performance. And the homeowner especially loves how the cooktop is showcased. Framed in good-looking millwork and decked out with a backsplash of handmade tiles featuring the homeowner's favorite flower-a dogwood-it's a true conversation piece.

Finally, the kitchen includes what Donleavy fondly calls "command cen-

tral." A planning desk set to the right of the refrigerator is the perfect spot to check e-mail, pay bills, or write to-do lists. Not only functional, it's goodlooking: The cabinetry for the desk is the same as the cabinetry throughout the kitchen.

Adjacent to the kitchen is the breakfast area, where the couple and their children enjoy most of their meals informally. A wall of windows washes the table with light, while a pleated valance adds finish to the cozy nook. Overhead, exposed ceiling beams fan out from the center of the space, creating yet another eye-catching focal point.

With the mix of classic style and high-tech features, the home is perfectly suited for entertaining, and that's exactly what the homeowners wanted.
